"I'm jealous of my sister," admits Carson Daly with a laugh. As incredulous as this may sound from the popular radio and TV personality, he has good reason. "I'm jealous because she has relocated with her family to a location with over a hundred golf courses and close to our parents. I can easily see myself doing that also," he adds, surely to the delight of his parents, Pattie Daly Caruso and Richard Caruso.

If the name Carson Daly is only vaguely familiar, you aren't in sync with of-the-moment TV. Daly is the former host of MTV's Total Request Live and current host of the wildly successful televised singing competition The Voice. As ecstatic and amazed as Daly is with the success of The Voice, it's his long-running latenight show, Last Call with Carson Daly, that's his baby. The show, which premiered in 2002 and airs weeknights at 1:30 a.m., turned Daly into one of the longest tenured hosts in late-night television.

A California native, Daly grew up in Santa Monica. Grateful that his stepfather, Richard, introduced him to the game of golf as a young boy, Daly was truly bit by the golf bug in high school, where he became a star player on the Santa Monica High School golfteam. After graduating in 1991, Daly continued to hone his game in the Coachella Valley, after moving there to attend College of the Desert. In fact, there was a time when he had aspirations of becoming a Tour player.




"I tried to qualify for the U.S. Open at Ironwood when I was playing well. I had a disastrous hole, and I think that was the turning point for me. I would have tried on the then Nike Tour, probably given it a shot, tried to play a few events, see how it would have gone I would have like to have done something. But we'll never know."

What we do know is that Daly has worked diligently in the entertainment business and achieved success and popularity. Humble and appreciative of his life, he quips, "I've never had more invites to golf tournaments."

These days, he continues to be passionate about the game and plays as much as possible. "January and February are when I'm able to play the most," he says. "The rest of the year is crazy busy."

A past winner of the former Bob Hope Chrysler Classic Pro Am, Daly returned to the desert this year for the Humana Challenge Pro Am. He is happy with all of the changes made to the tournament and with the focus on health and wellness. "It was an honor to be asked back by Humana and the Clinton Foundation; being in the desert holds such great memories for me."







Daly believes adamantly that the game of golf helps build strong character. "I like to think I'm a decent person; really, a lot of the things that I learned were from playing the game of golf, so making those correlations between life and golf is very important to do when you're young. You've got to sit back and let somebody else go first sometimes; there are some great lessons in there."

At this time Daly does not belong to a country club, but GMs take note: "I'm open for celebrity memberships from anyone who wants to give me one," Daly laughs. Perhaps his phone is already ringing with offers.

It seems to be a little-known fact that Daly and his father played a lot of junior golf with Earl and Tiger Woods, and that's what comes to mind when the TV star is asked who would make up his ultimate foursome. "I have such great memories of playing golf in my youth; I have to have my dad in there, that's for sure. And I remember playing in a Father/Son tournament with Earl and Tiger. We had so much fun playing junior golf in Southern California, so I'm going to say my dad, Tiger and Earl. Both of our fathers were very





instrumental to us on and off the course; I know how much Earl meant to Tiger."

Daly can be found nightly on television and daily on the radio. He's also a founding partner of 456 Entertainment, an independent record label, and hosts the annual special, New Year's Eve with Carson Daly. He and his girlfriend, Siri Pinter, are the proud parents of two children.

The entertainer would be the first one to agree that life is good. With a successful career, a single-digit handicap in golf and the ability to lead life to the fullest, Daly doesn't take more than two seconds to respond when asked to describe his life in one sentence. "Idon't know if you can print this, but I'm the luckiest bastard alive!"

She says her best achievements so far are her first win at the Navistar and playing in the Curtis Cup. Open, direct and full of laughter, Thompson has been home schooled all her life. She started playing golf at age five, following in the footsteps of her older brothers Curtis (an LSU team golfer) and Nicolas (a Tour player). Their

Prodigy pro golfer she may be, but off the course she was a 17-year old looking forward to her prom night last May 18 in Ft. Lauderdale. Through Facebook she invited America's servicemen ages 18 to 20 to send a photo and note about being her prom date.

She loves movies, particularly those with dancing. "I used to dance a lot, a shadow dancer with the mirror or in the shower," she laughs. "I love singing in the shower."

Thompson is very superstitious. She wears ladybug earrings and charms, and don't ask about Friday the 13th or spilling salt. Before her first win at the Navistar, waffles were her go-to meal, prepared by Valerie Perry at the Waffle House. In 2012, Thompson again had the same meal daily, and Perry didn't take vacation so she could be on the job for the defending champ!

Thompson is clear and philosophical beyond her years. "I'm looking forward to the places I get to see and play," she says. "Getting to experience all this is amazing; hopefully I can win along the way."





Ryann O'Toole took the college route before turning pro in May 2009, just after graduating from UCLA with a degree in sociology. In 2010, she grabbed two wins on the Symetra Tour. She was also a hit in Golf Channel's "Big Break Sandals Resort Show," which she calls "two weeks of my life that were really life changing."

The 5' 7" California beauty debuted on the LPGA Tour in 2011. "I love all Southern California sports—surfing, wakeboarding, skateboarding and snowboarding are my favorites.



When I got a scholarship to UCLA, I took their program over USC. I felt a better fit with the coach and the team."

It was during her LPGA rookie year that everything seemed to click. She was honored with a captain's pick for the Solheim Cup, and loved every moment. "It was a huge thrill," she says, "and my best golfing memory. I love the travel, seeing the world and the U.S. Ireland was very special during the Cup."

Being greeted by an elephant at her hotel during this year's Honda LPGA in Thailand was another hit, as was her trip to Australia, where she won. "I'll take my surfboard when I go back next year."

O'Toole loves discovering new places, but the 25-year-old San Clemente resident isn't a party girl. When she's not chilling at home she likes to go out for a drink or to have dinner at a local joint. When it comes to wine she favors Cabs and Malbecs, in beer she likes wheat beer, white ales and IPAs.

In addition to winning golf tournaments, her bucket list includes surfing in Costa Rica, an exciting balloon ride, eating her way through Italy, hiking Machu Picchu and Kilimanjaro, and bathing in an active volcano hot springs.

The Rankings As of Dec. 10, 2012, this is how the American women stacked up in the Rolex Women's World Golf Rankings

It has been a long drought for U.S. women's golf—18 years since an American, Beth Daniels, won the Player of the Year award. But **Stacy Lewis** triumphed in 2012 with four wins and 16 top-10 finishes. No, she didn't win a Major; but she did tie for second at the Wegman's LPGA Championship and the Evian Masters (a Major in 2013) and took fourth at the Kraft Nabisco. She's ranked 24th.

Stacy Lewis "I wanted to end that 18-year trend," emphasized Lewis, now in her fourth year on Tour and ranked No. 3, adding, "I know I haven't played my best golf yet."

> At the end of 2012, 31 Americans were in the top 100, but some of the longtime favorites had moved down rather than up. Cristie Kerr, the first American to reach World No.1 in 2010, was ranked 11th with her win at the Lorena Ochoa Invitational, while **Paula Creamer** lost seven places to finish at No. 12.



Big-hitting Brittany Lincicome couldn't win this year and slid down to 18th. Angela Stanford finished at 20th and Brittany Lang was ranked 27th, up from 32nd. Teen queen and 2007 Kraft winner at 15, Morgan Pressl plummeted from 16th to 38th with only one top-10 finish.


When Michelle Wie graduated from Stanford, speculation was rampant that she would finally play the golf she seemed capable of since bursting onto the global golf scene. But in 2012 she fell from 17th to 56th.


Ranked 74th ending her fourth season, Vicky Hurst is still after her first W. Tall and bubbly 19-year-old Jessica Korda made the biggest move in the 2012 rankings, jumping up a whopping 233 places to 77th. She won the ISPS Australian Women's Open at Royal Melbourne in a grueling six-way play-off that included Lincicome and Lewis.




Watch out for USC star and four-year All American Lizette Salas, who had a superb rookie year in 2012. She's ranked 91st and mentored by her idol, legend Nancy Lopez. Ever-popular **Natalie** Gulbis slid to 94th, and Pepperdine graduate Danielle Kang had a good rookie season, finishing 105th. Another grad to look for is UCLA's Sydnee Michaels; she ended her rookie season ranked 124th.

America had a surge in 2012. U.S. girls grabbed eight wins, the most by any country. Lewis with her best golf still to play will be difficult to catch, but finally it is "Game On" for America's girls!













t's a classic win-win. "This dream of ours has come true," says Richards. "Our 78 years of combined experience—with Dave's private club background and my higherend, daily-fee side—brings a unique character to being hands-on owners. We'll have great playing conditions and the impeccable service you expect when you come to a golf club." Players will have public-course access with club-level attributes. "I'm excited because there are only two daily-fee courses in Valley, one in Aspen and this one. We're going to be the top golf club on the Western Slope.

"As a 28-year resident in the Roaring Fork Valley, I thought RVR was the best golf club in the area when it was built," says Richards. "The design is user-friendly for all abilities, and the views are second to none with 14,000-foot Mt. Sopris visible from every hole. We'll have the best conditions, the way we want them.

We have added Visage GPS to all carts for the convenience of our players—they won't have to look for yardages, and the GPS shows each hole with front, middle and back tees to help those not familiar with the area or the golfcourse."

Alvarez and Richards are putting their expertise to good—and speedy—use after acquiring the course for \$1.2 million last August. Since then, Richards says they have added another "couple of million" into

upgrades such as course-maintenance equipment, restaurant renovations and a top chef to manage food-and-beverage services. Alvarez is a local PGA professional dedicated to top-notch course quality and operations, and Richards, longtime junior-golf coach and executive director of Aspen Junior Golf, assumes the role of director of golf and instruction.

The two partners have been on an ambitious whirlwind of activity to open

this season. "Our five-year search for a golf course came to an end when this popped up last April," Richards says. "This is sent from above. We love living in Colorado with the Rocky Mountains, and this is in our own backyard. The transition was tough, but, weather permitting, we plan on an April 1 to mid-April opening. The restaurant is scheduled to open at the end of May." Out-of-towners can look forward to stay-and-play packages with hotels in Aspen and Carbondale. "We're on the Crystal River, great for playing golf and outstanding fly-fishing and hiking and biking."

Although Aspen's junior-golf program leadership has been assumed by Jake Anderson, Richards remains on the board of directors. "I'm just a phone call away from helping him, and I have brought Aspen Junior Golf Satellite to RVR," he says. "We're just 29 miles from Aspen and we'll have an afternoon program here for kids at this end of the Valley." He says RVR will be an integral part of this year's AJG fundraiser with Chris DiMarco on July 15. The course also is scheduled to host the high school regional tournament May 5-6. 

ear Dance Golf Club owner Stuart Bruening doesn't need to go into a song-and-dance routine about his renowned course near Larkspur. Its continued popularity speaks for itself, with continued Top 10 listings for best courses to play in the state. Adding to there in our photographs. It's a fantastic piece of property."

Golfers feel like they're virtually the only ones on the course. Bruening says, "It's not in a housing development, but a conservation area with trees separating each hole. You'll never be swallowed up by homes. And the wildlife experience is wonderful with tons of elk and deer and bears, too, in season."

There's more to the venue than just the course, Bruening says. "We've got a wonderful staff and great service. Mark Pfingston, our head pro, food-and-beverage manager Michel Autret and greens superintendant Dave Cahalane all have been here since we opened 11 years ago, all





its intrigue, the venue is a study in dichotomy. "The course is challenging but fair, and golfers feel like they've been at a private club although it's public," says Bruening. "You can have the unique experience of a real mountain feel in the Front Range—without having to drive through the mountains."

Open since 2002, Ponderosa pines and elevation changes are key components to the beauty and playability of Bear Dance. Is there a signature hole? "I'm the builder here," says Bruening, part of the design team that included PGA members Corey Aurand, Dennis Hogan and Brian Whitcomb. "If we've got one signature hole, that means we've got 17 mediocre ones," he says with a laugh. "But the sixth hole features our logo bear paw in the bunkers, and the 16th is a very elevated Par 4. When you get to the top you're at 7,000 feet and can see Pike's Peak. People comment on that one." He adds, "People used to say our greens were too tough, but they have been modified and are not nearly as challenging." As far as views and aesthetic appeal: "We use every hole out




with a great level of expertise." Bear Dance also is the site of Colorado Section PGA offices. "We're in between Colorado Springs and Denver, where most of the golf professionals are working, so it's convenient for meetings. It's worked out great for them hanging their name on our building, and great for our tag also." Golfers can see memorabilia depicting the history of the PGA in Colorado in the clubhouse lobby.

With full dining services, Bear Dance is a destination spot for both a night out and special events. Lunch is served daily, with dinner every Thursday, Friday and Saturday. "Our chef has been here for seven years and creates wonderful food," says Bruening. "We have theme nights, such as Australian or Pacific Rim dishes." Reservations are strongly suggested on Friday and Saturday nights, and warm weather begs a meal outside anytime. "The patio overlooks the putting green and first tee, along with Hunt Mountain and Raspberry Butte."

Teetimes can be reserved up to seven days in advance at *BearDanceGolf.com*. "The lowest advance rate you'll find anywhere," says Bruening. In addition to Bear Dance, Southwest Greens Management also oversees sister courses Riverdale Dunes and The Knolls in Adams County, as well as the Short Course at The Golf Club at Cordillera in Edwards. 'ndividuals are not born experts in their area of interest. It takes many years and thousands of hours of deliberate practice for a person to become an expert in a given area, be it music, sports or any other category.

When an individual is first learning a new skill, the step-by-step instructions of how to perform that skill are kept in the working memory. Once a person has become proficient at the task, the information becomes procedural as opposed to declarative, meaning the performance becomes automatic.

Research suggests that high-level athletes have better recollection of their performance, as well as details about the environment. Novice athletes, on the other hand, have a better recollection of the step-by-step mechanical procedure they used to execute the skill. This speaks to the fact that the expert golfer is not using working memory; rather, he or she is performing the skill automatically and thus has the ability to pay attention to other stimuli and environmental cues without a decrease in performance of the primary task, and to adapt to different conditions when necessary—skills professional players must have.

The key to becoming an expert in golf, or any other desired domain, is deliberate practice. It has been documented that it takes approximately 10,000 hours of deliberate practice for anyone to become an expert in anything and move from using the working memory to the procedural memory. "Deliberate" is the key word here. Practicing without purpose will not develop the memory needed to encode the necessary motor programs to become an expert golfer.

One way to make practice deliberate is by goal setting, a terrific mental skill that can be used to improve your practice, increase motivation and focus and help you develop the desired motor programs to become an expert golfer, at whatever level of expertise is right for you.

The key is to set clear objectives and define the level of intensity necessary to achieve those objectives. When we fulfill a goal, we feel a sense of achievement; but if the goal isn't met, we may feel a sense of failure. That's why the process of goal setting is so important.

Here are some basic guidelines to follow for setting appropriate goals.

- · Make goals specific and attainable. A vague goal (e.g., I want to get better) will not help you. Goals should be as specific as possible. Typically what golfers desire is to play better, lower their handicap, hit the ball farther, be a more consistent putter and improve other skills. But simply stating that you want to be better and then going to the practice range to hit a bucket of balls will not correlate to improved abilities. Instead, you have to set attainable goals that will result in improvement in these areas. A good practice goal, for example, might be to start every practice having to make five 10foot putts in a row before hitting any balls on the range. Not only is this a concise goal, it's easy to measure improvement and success.
- \cdot Find the right level of challenge for you. Goals should not be so challenging that they are unattainable; however, if a goal is too easy it will not motivate you and your performance will suffer.
- · The goal should be within your control. For example, winning is not always within your control regardless of your execution. An opponent's game and environmental variables are outside of your control. The only thing you can control is your own personal performance.

- · The goal should reflect what *you* want to achieve, not someone else's goals.
- ·The goal should be measurable. Measuring progress will help keep you motivated to achieve your goals. For example, one of your goals might be increased focus on a specific swing-thought. To measure how well you are achieving that on the golf course, take a second score card with you and score yourself on your level of commitment. Use a scale of 1 (not committed at all; many other thoughts enter your mind) to 5 (completely committed) to score your chosen swing-thought for the day. Remember, you're not scoring the *result* of the shots. The more 4s and 5s you start to see on your scorecard, the better your actual golf scores will likely become.
- · Every practice or training session should include small goals that build toward the greater goal. One example of this might be how you approach your warm-up before teeing off. You could commit to spending at least the last 10 minutes of your warm-up going through your pre-shot routine for each ball you hit on the practice range, changing your target or club with each shot. That smaller goal helps you achieve larger goals on the course.

Learning how to effectively use goal setting is an excellent way to improve your deliberate practice procedures, which will ultimately help you achieve your desired level of expert performance.

BMW 650i

Luxury and power in one beautiful package

'n this day and age you can have it all. That must have been what designers were thinking when they went to the drawing board for the BMW 650i. Take a look at the styling and power and you'll find that the best of BMW's brawn has been combined with the supple elegance.

The higher-ups in Germany are calling the 650i a coupe in the sense that it isn't a sedan, though it has four doors. They are suggesting that there's more to this machine than meets the eye, and they're right. The exterior lines are both aggressive and reserved. There's a Mohammad Ali meets Grace Kelly factor going on here. You know there's power and you can't wait to take her out on the town.

It may sound odd to say, but the first features you'll notice in the 650i are the seats. Yes, the place where you first interact with the option) you'll be staring at 60 from a standstill in 4.3 seconds. The twin turbo V-8 engine has enough power to hold its own among the big names in the class, and the 455 horsepower will have you looking for opportunities to punch it. You could stand the 650i up against the Jag XK or Porsche Panamera and it will easily win several rounds—perhaps the whole bout, depending on the judges.

In the luxury division, the 650i is every bit the equal to the Mercedes CLS or Jaguar. The Bang and Olufson sound system has a tweeter that rises out of the dash and sounds exquisite, while the interior leather and wood trim is coach quality in every way.

On the outside, the 6er is a head turner. A somewhat controversial matte finish takes the traditional clear coat off the market and simplifies the paint a bit. It's unusual but that's the point. The stylish lines and aggressive posture make onlookers take



car hasn't been overlooked. The luxury-seating package is well worth the upgrade and makes it impossible to not dream about a quick drive to anywhere. You'll find that the controls are as intuitive as any on the market; in this car, you will not be confused about where to find the air conditioning or the radio. This may sound simple but plenty of so-called luxury coupes leave drivers stumped for weeks while they hire exploratory committees to find out how to sync their phone to the car's Bluetooth.

You'll have enough technology in the 650i to keep you wellcared for while not breaking you into a sweat when it comes to the simple things. Driver-assisted steering and breaking are nice features that give you a sense of control but are subtle enough to let you have the say so in how the car handles. You'll definitely notice a nice responsiveness when the 650i is in "sport" mode versus "comfort." You'll be glued to those luxury seats with your foot to the floor in sport mode. In comfort mode, enjoy a more relaxed ride that is still responsive without being punchy.

There's enough power under the hood to quicken the heart. Though the 650i weighs in at a hefty 4,300 pounds, the performance won't disappoint. With the xDrive (all-wheel drive

notice. Few of your neighbors will have seen a 650 and that sparks conversation. Expect a slew of questions and a few whistles. Double your mystique by opting for the convertible. The sportiness factor rises even more with the M Sport package that upgrades to 20-inch wheels and apron covers that are distinctive and add to the feeling of exclusivity.

One caution: don't take your boss on a road trip and stick him in the back seat.

While adults can manage a quick joy ride in the back, you'd be better off sticking your kids back there. BMW touts that this is a 4+1 seater but the +1 straddles the middle consol in the back seat and is less desirable than riding on the roof of a Mini Cooper.

The 650i will set you back a bit. The retail price, loaded, is around \$118,000 with the V-8 twin turbo. You can opt for a less expensive model by choosing the 350

horsepower six-cylinder engine and forgoing some of the accessories. But if you're in the market for a sports car that drives like a luxury vehicle, you'll want to give this shape-shifting beauty a look.

The 650i is the total package.




One caveat: leave other statement pieces at home; your ring should tell the whole story.
