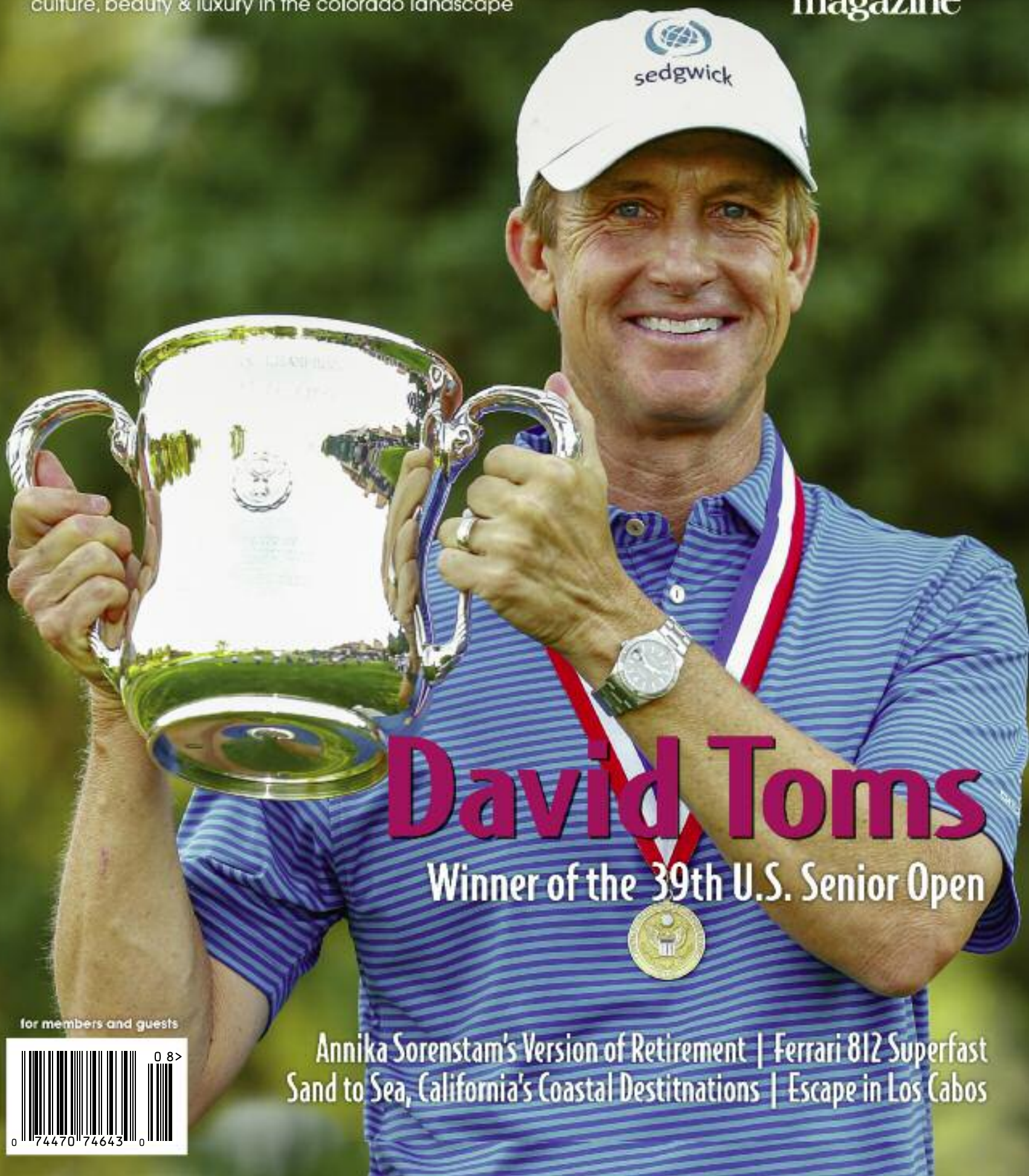

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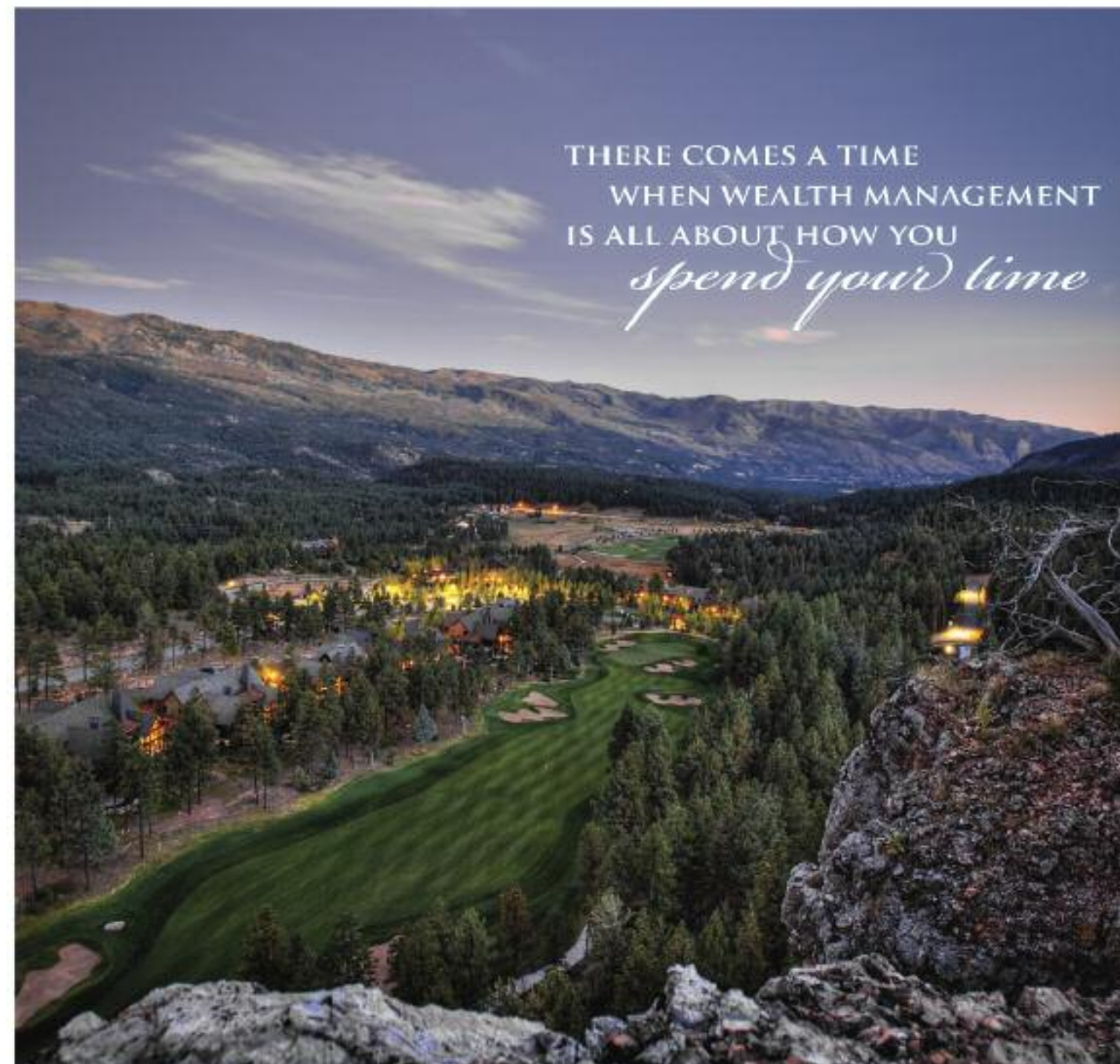
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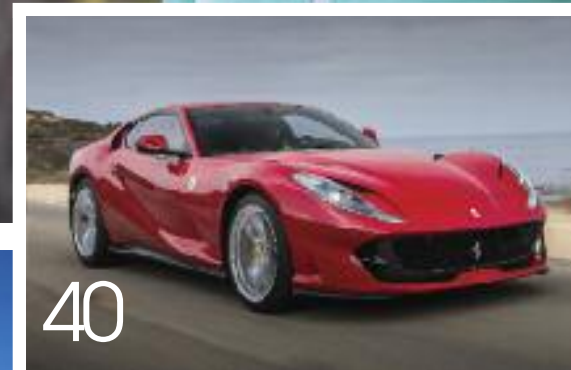

Toms Wins Second Major with Son

David Toms played it safe, sank a critical putt, and won his second major after a roller coaster week at the U.S. Senior Open. His come from behind victory was filled with ups and downs while his final holes mirrored his first major championship win with uncanny similarity.

The week started with his caddie, Scott Gneiser, going to the hospital suffering with unexplained chest pains. With Gneiser off the bag, Toms turned to his son Carter who plays collegiate golf at LSU. Carter's debut as a caddy left Toms feeling less than confident.

"I'm playing with Davis Love and Vijay Singh," Toms said. "I go up to them before the round and I'm apologizing. 'If he gets in your way just yell at him, whatever, he can take it.' Every time I hit it in the bunker I never wanted to hit it in the bunker because I didn't want to see what he was going to -- rake job and all that kind of stuff."

Toms shot a first-round 70, leaving him four shots behind Jerry Kelly. The second day was worse after Toms struggled to find the speed on the greens and finished with a 71, six shots off the lead. Things could have gotten out of hand if not for Carter's encouragement.

"He really kept me in there," Toms said. "I was 3-over par early in the round. He was so positive."

Gneiser's health checked out and he was back on the bag for round three. Toms lit it up shooting 66 and finished just a shot behind Kelly who struggled with his putter — three-putting from two feet on the Broadmoor East's 12th hole. Every player seemed vexed by the slick and sidwinding greens.

"It's been a nightmare on the greens," Miguel Angel Jimenez said. "I think I need to have a tall glass of wine and relax."

Sunday was set up for a shootout and that's exactly what the galleries got. Toms pulled ahead when he drained a 20-foot birdie put on No. 16.

"I knew that with 17 coming up, if I was going to make a birdie, it had to happen on (16)," Toms said. "It was uphill, pretty straight, and I put it right in the middle."

He was right, 17 gave him trouble immediately. Toms' tee shot found the fairway bunker and he chose to lay up to 98 yards for this third shot. His approach

surged past the hole leaving a slippery 20 footer coming back down the hill. He sunk it to keep the lead.

On 18 Toms played conservative and was safely on in two. Like his final hole at the 2001 PGA Championship, his only other major, he two-putted for par. That was good enough to give him the trophy then, and at the 39th U.S. Senior Open Championship.

Toms now has to figure out how to split the caddie payout and what to do with his \$720,000 purse. The win puts him atop the PGA Tour Champions money list and gives him the lead in the Charles Schwab Cup points race.

Toms take on the whole week?

"I guess it was meant to be."

Golfer's Playbook

Make a Splash for Greenside Bunker Success

Many golf courses have deep pot bunkers guarding the greens and punishing a less-than-perfect approach shot. When a player hits into one of these challenging greenside bunkers, it can be very anxiety producing. My key to executing great golf shots from the sand is to “splash” the sand in order to carry the ball up and out of the bunker.

Here are my strategies for playing successfully from these bunkers.

SETUP

When I address a ball in the sand, I angle my feet and body alignment slightly left of the target, in what's called an “open” position. With my alignment open, I lay my higher-lofted wedge open as well, so it has the appearance that the clubface is aimed right of the flag. The alignment of my body counterbalances the angle of the clubface. With my body alignment angled 20 degrees left, I want my clubface angled 20 degrees right, which will make golf ball come out of the bunker straight.

In my setup, I also want to feel like I am “sitting down,” so when I swing through the ball the bottom of my clubface will arc through a couple of inches *beneath* the ball. You will also notice in the photo that I have the shaft leaning slightly forward toward the target. This way I am actually “pre-setting” the angle of the shaft for impact.



BACKSWING

I want a big core windup in my backswing, which in turn will move the club back for me. The mistake that many high-handicap golfers make in the sand is that they don't turn their body enough and they use their arms too much in moving the club. My arms are actually very quiet when I allow my body rotation to do all the work.

You can see in the photo that when I'm at the completion of my backswing, I have my legs flexed as if I'm sitting on a chair, and my shoulders have rotated nearly 90 degrees, creating the feeling of being wound up like a loaded spring.



SPLASH THE SAND

As I make my way through impact, my focus is to splash the slightly open clubface through the sand, which will carry the ball up onto the green for me. You can see in the photos how much work the sand does to carry my ball out of the bunker. Many golfers try to pick the ball clean out of the bunker, but this is a mistake. When you use the sand, it does much of the lifting.

SAND DRILL

The next time you're in a practice bunker, follow my steps on setup. Then, without using a ball, swing and splash through the sand with your clubface. Try to get the feel of splashing the clubface through the sand and throwing the sand up onto the putting surface. Once you've done that, place a ball on to the ground and feel the same splash of the sand as you swing through, allowing the sand to carry the ball up and out of the bunker and onto the green.

Bikram Yoga: The Power behind the Series

Beyond the breath: The secret to outdriving your golf partners and winning your tennis matches



Golfers who speak of Tiger Woods and Fred Couples in the same sentence may be thinking back on “problems,” which we know can be deadly to one’s game. Bikram Yoga aficionados think Half Moon Pose—backward bending.

Strengthening the spine and avoiding pain is key to increasing performance success. The power of the Bikram series of

yoga poses continues as we move our way through the standing series warm-up.

In the past two issues of *Desert Golf and Tennis* we covered the beginning breathing exercise and two of the moves in Half Moon pose. Within Half Moon pose are two additional moves: backward bending and forward bending. The concentration in this article is on backward bending. We will complete the entire spine

warm-up in the next issue with the forward fold. Collectively these four moves within Half Moon pose master bending the body in all four directions, stimulating the spine at the very start of class.

Backward Bending

Bikram Choudhury was very specific in his emphasis on the importance of the backward bend. The human body is

continuously bending forward in everyday life. We drop something and we bend forward to pick it up. We get into our cars with a forward bend. I always get a laugh out of my students when I say, “How often are you standing around talking to your friends and say, ‘Excuse me, I need to do a quick backbend to even myself out.’”

We are lopsided beings and need to be cognizant of balancing both sides of our bodies. Within the Bikram Yoga series, backward and forward bending with hands-to-feet warm-up do just that!

Alignment and form are always key. With Half Moon we can concentrate on our form in the mirror. With backward bending and hands-to-feet, instructor cues are instrumental.

Beginning students struggle in Half Moon pose with keeping their elbows straight and “glued” against their ears, and their knees “locked” out. In side bending, the issue is usually physical.

In backward bending, the issue is typically mental. There’s a lot of fear when one moves into a backward bend for the first time, which is not surprising given that it is not something we do on a daily basis. However, the benefits of backward bending are monumental, so getting over the fear is imperative.

Backward bending is so therapeutic that there are entire workshops on it. Golfers and tennis players quickly see results in increased agility after engaging in consistent back-bending exercises. Nothing is more stimulating to the spine than getting an infusion of blood flow there. When done in a heated environment, as in Bikram Yoga, the results are accelerated.

Bill Cardone, a Bikram Yoga practitioner for 10 years, states that his consistent practice has been a “game changer.” He cites backward bends in particular as having strengthened his spine and increased his flexibility. “I have been playing golf for over 30 years and have no back issues,” he says. “I am capable of hitting my 8 iron 150 yards at 60 years of age, which I could not accomplish at age 30.”

The Benefits of Backward Bending

The benefits can impact multiple areas of your life and body. Backbending:

- Counters our continuous forward bending, such as in deskwork or dental and other professions
- Increases mobility of the spine

- Improves posture
- Boosts mood, relieves stress and wakes you up by stimulating endorphins
- Opens the heart and the mind
- Relieves symptoms of pain related to immobility, stiffness and sciatica

Backward Bending Posture Mechanics

The backward bend in the Half Moon warm-up is very specific. Since classes take place in a heated environment and the student has already completed a strong breathing exercise and alternating side bending for a full minute per side, the spine is ready to move backward.

Slow and steady is the key for proper alignment and letting go of fear. A gradual decent while concentrating on form is essential, but very little depth needs to be achieved for one to gain the full benefit of the compression/release tourniquet effect.

Students put their feet together with heels and toes touching, arms over their head. Glut and quad muscles are engaged as they breathe slowly and lift their chest up toward the sky. They bring their arms

back to the wall behind them as they slowly lower into a backbend. They re-engage their leg muscles and keep some lift in their chest so they don’t collapse into their lower back as they move deeper into the bend. The visual is a large beach ball they are arching up and back over, coordinating their movements with their breath. They hold static in the deepest expression before release and slowly coming back to center with their arms directly over their head.

There is some discomfort associated with backward bending, but it’s that “good hurt” sensation.

Nothing is more healing and/or preventative for spinal injuries than backbending.

If you’re nervous about bending backward, go slowly. Start with side bending in the Half Moon pose, along with gentle spine twists and yoga’s cat/cow movements. Eventually you can work yourself up to the amazing world and significant results of backward bending.

Annika Sorenstam's Version of Retirement

It just might be as busy as competing on the LPGA Tour

A foundation that runs six tournaments annually, benefitting women's golf at all levels. Golf course design. A clothing line. Captain of a major international sports team. Wife, mom, taxi driver, cheerleader—even co-owner of a concrete business.

That's "retirement" for Annika Sorenstam, and that's just how she likes it.

Sorenstam walked away from the LPGA Tour at the end of the 2008 season, arguably at the top of her game. She ended the year at No. 3 in the Rolex World Rankings, won three tournaments and finished tied for seventh in her final tournament, the Dubai Ladies Masters. Her professional career wrapped up with a total of 93 wins (72 on the LPGA Tour, 17 on the Ladies European Tour), 10 majors and three ANA Inspiration titles.

Yet even as she announced her retirement in May of 2008, her ultra-active future was already in place. In fact, she cited her willingness to transition into the business, philanthropic and family world during her announcement. She also declared her intention to wed Mike McGee, son of former PGA Tour player Jerry McGee and managing director for her brand. The two tied the knot in January 2009, and now have two children, Ava (7) and William (5).

Since then, she has not looked back, gaining traction in all of her current endeavors, and actually expanding her list of responsibilities by taking on the captaincy of the European Solheim Cup team and becoming an investor in Capillary



Concrete, which produces a protective and draining sub-base for sports areas. She's also taken her expanding parental role head-on, acting as a major force in Ava and William's lives by doing the things most moms do: transporting them to games, cheering them on at games, helping them with homework, dropping them off at school and being there in general.

"It's a fun time for me. What I really love about my job is I get to pick and choose what I like to do," she says. "I'm very fortunate that I can work a little here on design when it's that time of year, then I move on to maybe photo shoots for the clothing. Then I spend a few hours every week on Capillary Concrete, which I never



facilities to clubs hosting the LPGA Tour. And, of course, the Solheim Cup now requires more of her attention as this year's competition gets closer. The 2017 event is scheduled for August 14-20 at the Des Moines Golf and Country Club in West Des Moines, Iowa.

"I would say I love to stay busy, I love doing things," Sorenstam says. "That's one of the reasons I don't miss competitive golf, because I have so many other things going that I like. If I didn't have that, I'd probably be sitting at home wondering what life on tour would be like. So having all these balls in the air is fun. I'm learning a lot about a lot of different things. Kids certainly challenge you, so it's just a different type of life, a different chapter of my life."

Upon learning about Sorenstam's post-LPGA lifestyle, most are inclined to wonder how she does it. Sorenstam says it helps to simply be that type of person—one who loves to work, loves to learn and loves to stay busy. She also says time management is crucial to getting it all

thought I would. But that's what happens when you retire from golf; you learn about concrete."

Sorenstam has other concrete responsibilities outside the house, including the Annika Foundation, which provides opportunities in women's golf at the junior, collegiate and professional levels while teaching young people the importance of living a healthy, active lifestyle through fitness and nutrition. It hosts six tournaments a year globally, recently conducting its annual U.S. event at Reunion Resort in Orlando. This fall, the foundation will host the Annika Intercollegiate in Minneapolis, Minnesota, and will also conduct events in China, Argentina, and Sweden.

Then there's Annika Course Design, responsible for seven major projects worldwide including a joint effort with Arnold Palmer Design in Lake Elmo, Minnesota. The two firms are combining to renovate the former Tartan Park Golf Course owned by 3M Corporation. The 27-hole facility will be pared down to 18 holes, with nine designed by Sorenstam and nine designed by Palmer, hence its new name: The King & The Queen.

Sorenstam has also been working relentlessly on her clothing business, the Annika Collection, since retirement from the professional game, and her designs are now available at courses from municipal



done, along with the ability to compartmentalize her focus, taking on one task as a time and thinking of nothing else.

"Time management is very important to me. I try to structure my time to be efficient and scheduling is really important," she says. "This morning I'll be working on this, and next week I'll be working on this, so it's all about scheduling and quality time. When I do it, I'm doing it. I try not to be interrupted with something else. After a few hours I'm done focusing on that [project] and I'm ready for something else."

To help balance work and family life, Sorenstam tries to limit out-of-town business trips to 24-hour affairs, with a goal of being home for bedtime or, at the very least, home in the morning in time for breakfast and a quick shuttle to school. On the weekends, the family enjoys simply spending time together, hanging out in Orlando.

As much as she loves her work, Sorenstam says one day she will slow down. "You go through career changes when you get to different phases of your life," she says. "The Solheim Cup won't be around after August, so that will free me up. With the foundation, we're making great headway, so I see myself continuing to work on that. And I love my collection; I'd like for that to continue."

But as her kids get older, she wants to spend more time with them. "I want to be there, I want to learn with them and help them along as much as I can. Again, I don't mind being busy. I like the juggling back and forth. It gives you a little variety. I think it's important to do what you like also. I think I'm a better mom if I can do the things I enjoy, then spend time with [my children] on their things."

Golf and POTUS: The Attraction Continues

Like many of his predecessors, the 45th U.S. president plays golf

ABERDEEN, SCOTLAND

This 18-hole championship course designed by Dr. Martin Hawtree encompasses 7,400 yards and impressive views of the jagged coast and expansive valleys.

DOONBEG, IRELAND

Spanning 1.5 miles of crescent shaped beach and century-old sand dunes, the Greg Norman-designed course at Trump International Golf Links offers extraordinary views of the Atlantic Ocean.

MIAMI, FLORIDA

Trump National Doral plays host to professional golfers and events across its four different courses. It also boasts some of the toughest holes and most spectacular views in Florida.

FERRY POINT, NEW YORK

The 18-hole, Jack Nicklaus signature design, links-style course is designed to take advantage of the spectacular views of the Manhattan skyline, East River and Whitestone and Throgs Neck bridges. It measures 7,407 yards.

President Donald Trump started playing golf at the age of 12. He is the 16th of the past 19 American presidents to have a passion for the game of golf. Like past leaders, Trump is a staunch advocate for the game; unlike most, however, he has also made millions on the business side of the fairways and greens via the 17 golf courses in the current Trump Golf portfolio.

With a number of past presidents also having great affection for the Coachella Valley, it stands to reason that the Trump Corporation might start eyeing the California desert for a new Trump National golf facility. Only time will tell. Yet there are already many presidential golf stories in the Coachella Valley.

It's hard to beat Dwight Eisenhower getting his first hole-in-one at Seven Lakes Country Club in Palm Springs at the age of 77. John F. Kennedy was known to frequent Indian Palms in Indio, the site of the Cochran-Oldham Ranch and its golf course. Richard Nixon, George H.W. Bush, Ronald Reagan, George W. Bush and Bill Clinton spent many a desert day on the area's courses, often at Sunnylands as the guests of Walter and Leonore Annenberg. Gerald Ford lived at Thunderbird Country Club in Rancho Mirage and was seen daily trying to hone his game. Barak Obama, like Ford, recently purchased a desert home that's set up against the mountains at Thunderbird Heights in Rancho Mirage.

So what is it about golf that attracts our country's leaders? We know the game provides a challenge, and can even cause anguish

and stress. We also know there is a peace and tranquility in golf and it's easy to get lost in the game and forget the troubles of the world. Perhaps that is golf's most powerful allure for leaders who face no end of world troubles.

The first president to play was William Howard Taft (1909-1913). Taft was a 20 handicap and was said to always play out every hole.

Woodrow Wilson (1913-21) played as often as possible, logging more than 1,000 rounds while in office.

Warren G. Harding (1921-23) played twice a week, often scoring in triple digits. His legacy to the game: The outstanding TPC Harding Park golf course in San Francisco.

Calvin Coolidge (1923-29) played out of obligation, shooting double-digits on each hole. The story is told that when successor Herbert Hoover moved into the White House, the only thing left behind was Coolidge's bag of clubs.

Before he contracted polio at age 39, Franklin D. Roosevelt (1933-45) was an avid and accomplished golfer. His greatest legacy to the game was the funding of public-works projects, which included dozens of municipal golf courses.

Dwight D. Eisenhower (1953-1961) was often criticized for his obsession with the sport. His friendship with icon Arnold Palmer helped lift golf to new levels of popularity. During his tenure, the number of golfers in America more than doubled. He also installed a putting green on the White House lawn.

LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA

HUDSON VALLEY, NEW YORK

Located in the heart of Hudson Valley, Trump National features breathtaking views of Stormville Mountain, making this spectacular course both highly competitive and visually stimulating.

John F. Kennedy (1961-63) had a famously bad back as well as Addison's disease, which prevented the 35th president from reaching his enormous potential as a golfer. Though he played often at Burning Tree, it was said he skipped around the course, hardly ever playing a full round of 18 or even nine holes.

Lyndon B. Johnson (1963-69) played with an ulterior motive after realizing golf was the perfect activity for political negotiations. The votes Johnson needed to pass the Civil Right Act of 1964 were secured on the golf course.

While serving as vice president under Eisenhower, Richard Nixon (1969-74) dutifully took up the game and became a solid player, once breaking 80 and playing to a 12 handicap.

A few errant drives in pro-ams contributed to the 38th president's reputation as a klutz. But Gerald Ford

(1974-77), a former Michigan offensive lineman, often broke 90. He became the first president to join the USGA, doing so in a ceremony at the White House and was honorary chairman of the first Presidents Cup (1994).

Ronald Reagan (1981-89) did not play much, but he had a powerful swing.

George H.W. Bush (1989-93) was born into a family with a rich golf tradition. His maternal grandfather, George Herbert Walker, was president of the USGA and founded the Walker Cup. His father, Prescott Bush, also was a USGA president. It was for his dedication to the game, not his playing ability as an 11-handicap, that President Bush was inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame.

Bill Clinton (1993-2001) had an undeniably positive impact on the game of golf, perhaps most notably through his involvement with the charity tournament

now known as the CareerBuilder Challenge. Clinton also re-installed the White House putting green that Richard Nixon removed.

George W. Bush (2001-2009) played to a 15-handicap before giving up golf at the outbreak of the Second Iraq War. After leaving office, he returned to the sport, establishing the Warrior Open honoring U.S. servicemen.

Barack Obama (2009-2017) is the eighth left-hander in the White House but the first to play golf.

Golfing presidents are by far the majority. Only three presidents since Taft—Herbert Hoover, Harry Truman, and Jimmy Carter—did not play the game.

As for Trump, he lists his handicap as 2.8 on the USGA's Golf Handicap and Information Network, making him an extraordinary golfer at any age, but truly phenomenal for someone who is 70.

Perhaps just as extraordinary is his income from Trump Golf holdings. In 2016, Trump released his Personal Financial Disclosure (PFD) forms revealing over \$300 million in income from his golf courses and resorts.

Having had a tumultuous relationship the past year with PGA of America, Trump has been seen playing golf with the new PGA president and Toscana Country Club resident, Paul Levy. Will this help future relations? The game should hope so. Currently the PGA is scheduled to hold the 2017 Senior PGA Championship at Trump National in Virginia, and the 2022 PGA Championship at Trump National in New Jersey.

From Scotland to Palm Beach, Los Angeles to Dubai, Trump

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Whether you like Trump or not, his presidency will shine a different light on the game that seems to be recovering at least slightly from a major slump. As a golf course owner, designer and player, maybe President Trump will help make golf as a business “great again.”

Located 30 minutes from midtown Manhattan, this 7,291-yard course is challenging for all players. Among its impressive water features is an exquisite 101-foot waterfall.

The Game is On

Are you thinking of taking a golfing trip to Scotland? That's a good choice!



Hell Bunker Hole No.17

It's on every golfer's wish list to play the Old Course at St Andrews. Visiting St Andrews and playing The Old, which is incredibly special and steeped in history, is unforgettable. Where else can you play over a bunker called Hell; drive over a corner of a substantial five-star hotel; be in bounds and play from a

road that looks as if it were made for a horse and a cart; play down a main street where, if you knock the ball out of bounds, you can buy a cashmere sweater in a store while retrieving your ball; and drive over a pathway called Granny Clark's Wynd—or as I unfortunately called it my first time commentating for BBC, Granny Clark's WIND? And where else can you play the first and eighteenth holes without any trace of a bunker?

Add to all of this numerous semi-blind second shots, massive double greens whose hole numbers always add up to 18 (e.g. 4/14

6/12), and the fact that if you wound the clock back 70 years or so you could enjoy a steam locomotive charging along within a few yards of the 16th fairway. Those trains always contained a number imprinted on the boiler (the front engine) and, as the ubiquitous Henry Longhurst once said during a live BBC TV commentary, "Ah, there goes the 2.15 from Levin heading toward Luchars. I do believe I can read its number—242433—which is a darn sight better than Mr. Palmer's score over the last six holes!"

You might well ask who would design a golf course like this. As it evolved some 600 years ago and many of the bunkers were born through sheep burrowing into the sand dunes for shelter, it's hard to establish who was, in fact, the architect of this masterpiece. Further, in centuries gone by, the course used to be played backward to how it is played today.

The question is: Would a modern-day architect design a golf course like this? I doubt it, but I tell you what, it sure is fun to play!

The experience of addressing the ball on the first tee, with the large bay window of the 'Big Room,' part of the Royal & Ancient clubhouse, looming down on you, plus the golfing gods bearing down on you from above, is enough to give anybody wobbly knees and the wish for a quick tot of Scotch whisky to settle the frayed

nerves! The fact that the first fairway is 110 yards wide doesn't help as it suddenly looks like one of the narrowest tee shots you've ever seen.

Mentioning the golfing gods bearing down, I had the pleasure of playing with Jack Nicklaus in the 3rd round in The Open Championship at St Andrews in 1970. As we approached the 1st tee, there standing before us was the then Prime Minister of Great Britain, Edward (Ted) Heath.

Jack opened the conversation, "Mr. Prime Minister, it's wonderful that you have taken time out from No.10 Downing Street to travel up to Scotland and greet the players on the 1st tee." Heath's swift retort was, "I'm probably doing a great deal more good here than I would be at No.10!" And so the game was on!

Jack and I were lying 3rd and 4th in The Open at that stage and we both made par at the first hole. As we walked to the 2nd tee, Jack said, "I have now played 37 holes without a bogey." It would seem that the golfing gods have exceptional hearing. Jack immediately three-putted the hole for a bogey!

He did go on to win The Open that year in a play-off with Doug Sanders. Many of you will remember the short putt that Doug missed on the 18th green that would have given him the outright win of The 1970 Open Championship. Doug is

now in his 80s and from time to time I play golf with him. One hates to bring the subject up, but I once dared to ask him how often he thinks about that missed putt. In his usual colorful manner and with a wry smile, he replied, "Really not that often only three times a day."

Apart from the wonderful golfing to be had on The Old Course, Kingsbarns is definitely also worth a visit as it is less than 15 minutes by car from the center of St Andrews and exudes many of the qualities of the great links golf courses. Farther up the east coast of Scotland is Castle Stuart. The developer, Mark Parsinen, did an exceptional job by building a very playable links course that has a multitude of interesting features together with amazing views of the Moray Firth. The course turned out so well that it has now hosted several Scottish Opens, which is contested just prior to The Open Championship. A few other courses also come to mind on the east coast of Scotland, including Muirfield, Carnoustie and Royal Dornoch. And there are a host of others that may not be household names but that represent a good day's golf in Scotland and likely will be accompanied

by a stiff sea breeze, later to be followed by a stiff Scotch.

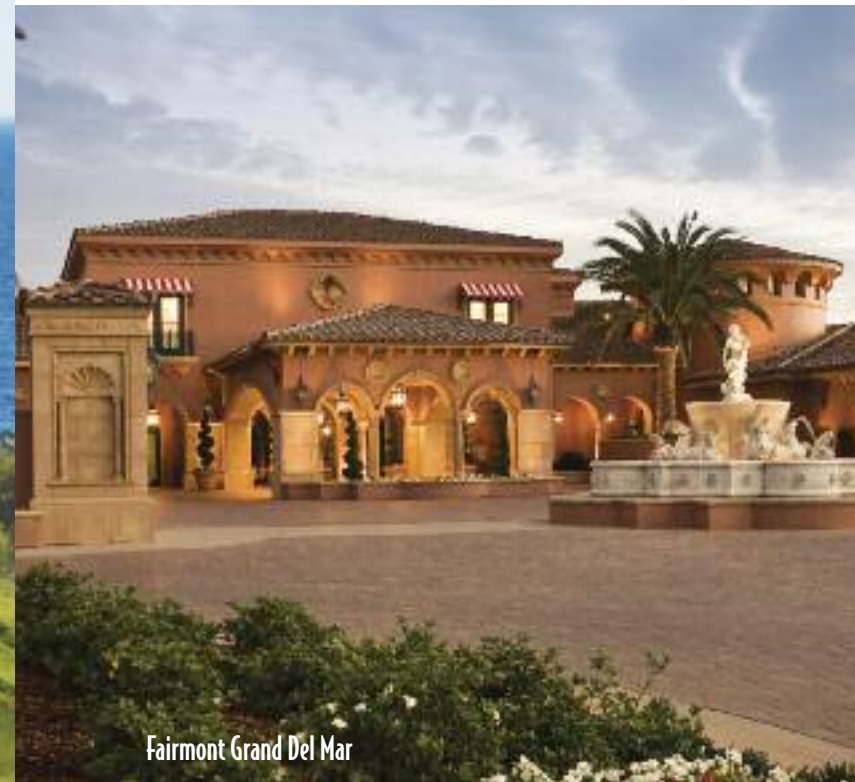

The luxe spa is one of only 56 Forbes Five Star spas in the world. There are six fabulous dining venues to choose from, including one with a children's menu and special pricing for different ages. 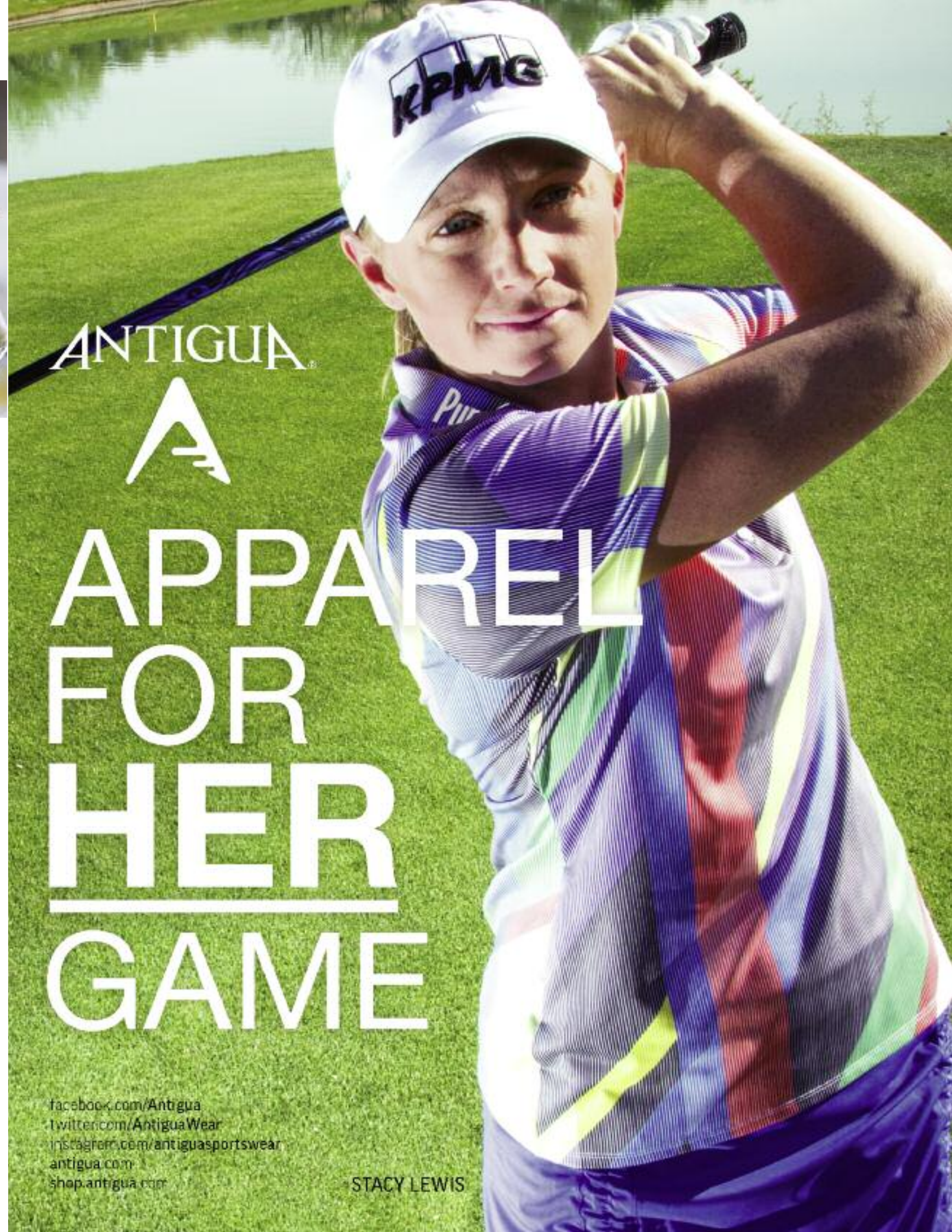

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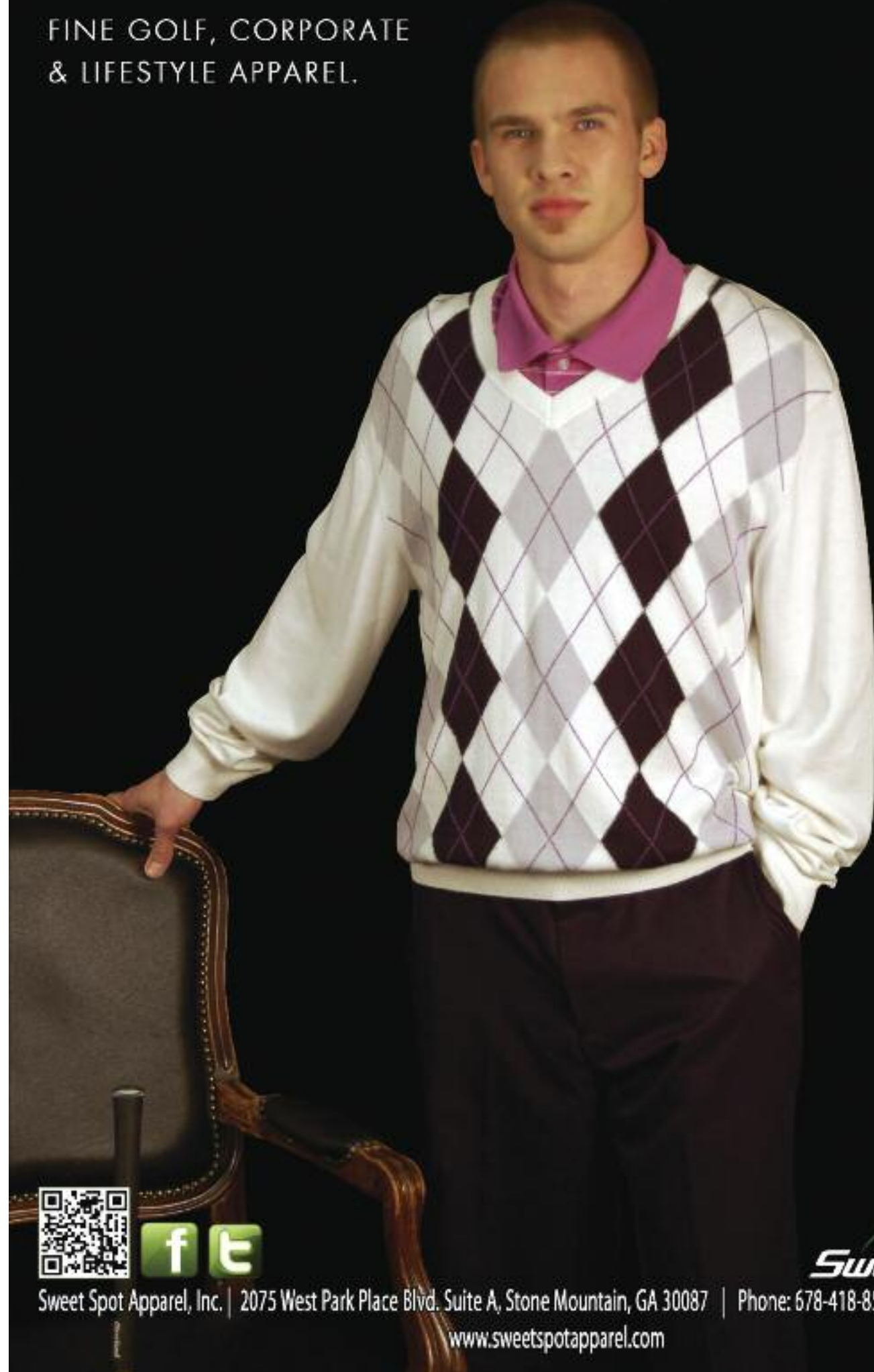

Cabo San Lucas, to the south, is as famous for nightlife as for sport fishing, restaurants and shopping. San Jose del Cabo, on the north/west end of the corridor, is a bit more serene with history, authentic Mexican culture and unspoiled nature among its attributes.

Los Cabos at its core is about *doing and experiencing*. Yellow fin tuna are prevalent September through January, and the warmer waters of summer and early fall bring the challenge of wahoo and sailfish. For a chance at hammerheads and makos, arrive in winter or early spring. Two well-known outfitters to contact are Pisces Sportfishing and Picante Sportfishing.

Whatever you desire in a vacation can be found in Los Cabos. There are so many golf courses, resorts, restaurants and adventure to choose from, you'll no doubt be booking your return trip before you ever leave your first vacation there.

Ferrari 812 Superfast

70 years and better than ever



rear spoiler. The sweeping side panels give a nod to its predecessor, the F12berlinetta. The cabin is a mix of ultra-luxe and Formula One racing features.

Most of the voodoo is underneath where Ferrari engineers have created downdraft and reduced drag like sorcerers of physics. The hocus pocus creates a machine that eats curves for breakfast and is just getting started at 6,000 rpm. Vents and gashes across the body work both aesthetically and functionally. Two passive flaps in the front end open by pressure of the airflow created at 124 mph. That force works to stall the front diffuser and reduce drag, while three flaps in the rear of the car mirror that effort to the rear diffuser.

The Superfast is the first Ferrari to have electronic power steering. The steering system replaced a hydraulic version and is paired with a traction-control system called Side Slip Control to give drivers a completely integrated steering experience. All systems operate to alert drivers of oversteer or understeer. The result is a strong feeling that doesn't try to correct you but rather follows your lead.

The 812 Superfast isn't petite. Weighing in at over 3,300 pounds, the wheelbase and length are wide and long at 107 and 183 inches, respectively. That's nearly a foot longer than an Audi R8.

Inside there are no frills. A simple screen on the passenger's side



and two customizable screens on the dash handle all that's requires. An oversized tachometer tells you what's important to Ferrari—as it should be.

It's hard to comprehend how the V-12 engine does what it does. The Superfast delivers max torque of 529 lb-ft at 7,000 rpm. The mystifying piece of this equation is that it also gives 424 lb-ft way down at 3,500 rpm. At the low end you're getting big torque and you haven't even gotten out of the neighborhood. As the engine reaches for the higher rpm, you sense you're just getting warmed up above 6,000 rpm.

The 6.5-liter engine is destined to make news for another seven decades as car lovers crave it and manufacturers work to emulate it. Much of the redesign internally hinged on reworking piston strokes and psi. This gives the extra horsepower without having to resort to turbo or other gimmicks.

No Ferrari is a miss, even for the most discerning and spoiled drivers; however,



the 812 Superfast marks a new line on the road for others to follow. The drive is comfortable, the engine note strong and performance mind-blowing. In a day when automakers trick out a car with gadgets and gizmos, Ferrari has carved its own trail by bucking the trend. Nothing is overlooked but nothing superfluous is added, either.

It's state-of-the-art design with simplicity.

The exterior brawn and brains exemplify the Enzo Ferrari legacy. The sophistication of aerodynamics and



engineering stand on the shoulders of decades of racing excellence, and styling and performance dare competitors to imagine equality as attainable.

The 812 Superfast takes 70 years in stride and scoffs at those who would call the brand old school. Think Ferrari is slowing down? Just try to keep up. With a top speed of 221 mph, good luck!

Marc Jacobs also came out swinging with looks that have garnered a lot of attention this spring. Jacobs was the youngest designer to win the CFDA Perry Ellis Award for New Fashion Talent, and he’s been at the top of the fashion heap since 1986. He’s equally adept at turning out his trademark “grunge aesthetic” as he is at crafting ladylike suits and dresses.

The Marc Jacobs Tiered Fringe Skirt features five rows of scallop detail and an A-line silhouette that hits at the knees. This playful black number can be tastefully worn to a cocktail party or charity lunch. Made from imported Italian viscose, this swingy skirt retails for \$795.

The Marc Jacobs Fringe-Trim Sheath Dress adds movement and swing to layers of dangling silk threads at the bust as well as the thigh. In soft pink, the satin-back crepe construction has a sleeveless fitted silhouette and a wide V-neckline with peek-a-boo detail. It’s made in the United States of imported fabric and is available for \$1,500.

Another fashion influencer, Alexander McQueen manages to dominate the runways year after year. The late English designer Lee Alexander McQueen founded the design house in 1992, quickly gaining a reputation for opulent, sometimes outrageous, bespoke creations. Today the line is under the creative direction of Sarah Burton, perhaps best known for creating the gown worn by Catherine Middleton when she wed Prince William.

The spunky Alexander McQueen Mixed-Plaid Dress in black and white flatters a whittled waist and toned gams. The mixed-plaid pattern with patchwork details over the hips and red accents throughout features short sleeves, a V-neckline and a fit-and-flare silhouette with a front kick pleat. Made from a wool, mohair and polyester combination, the dress boasts a classy look with contemporary, flirty flair. It sells for \$2,395.

Showcasing the innovation of this year’s compositions, the Alexander McQueen Sleeveless Poplin Blouse is fluffy and tailored at the same time. The white, sleeveless concoction has a high crew neckline with ruffled trim embellishment at the arms, providing full shoulder coverage, as well as along the dramatic, asymmetric hem. A button-keyhole rests at the back, complementing the trapeze silhouette. This blouse is a slipover style made in Italy of 100 percent cotton and retails for \$2,045.

The House of McQueen suggests pairing the blouse with the Alexander McQueen Patchwork Plaid Ankle Pants. Cropped at the ankles, the black, white and red slacks have a slim fit with straight legs and crisp, front pleats that offer a mix of classic and on-trend. The silk-lined mini length provides sass, emphasizing the luxurious wool, silk and nylon fabric blend. The dress may be purchased for \$2,765.

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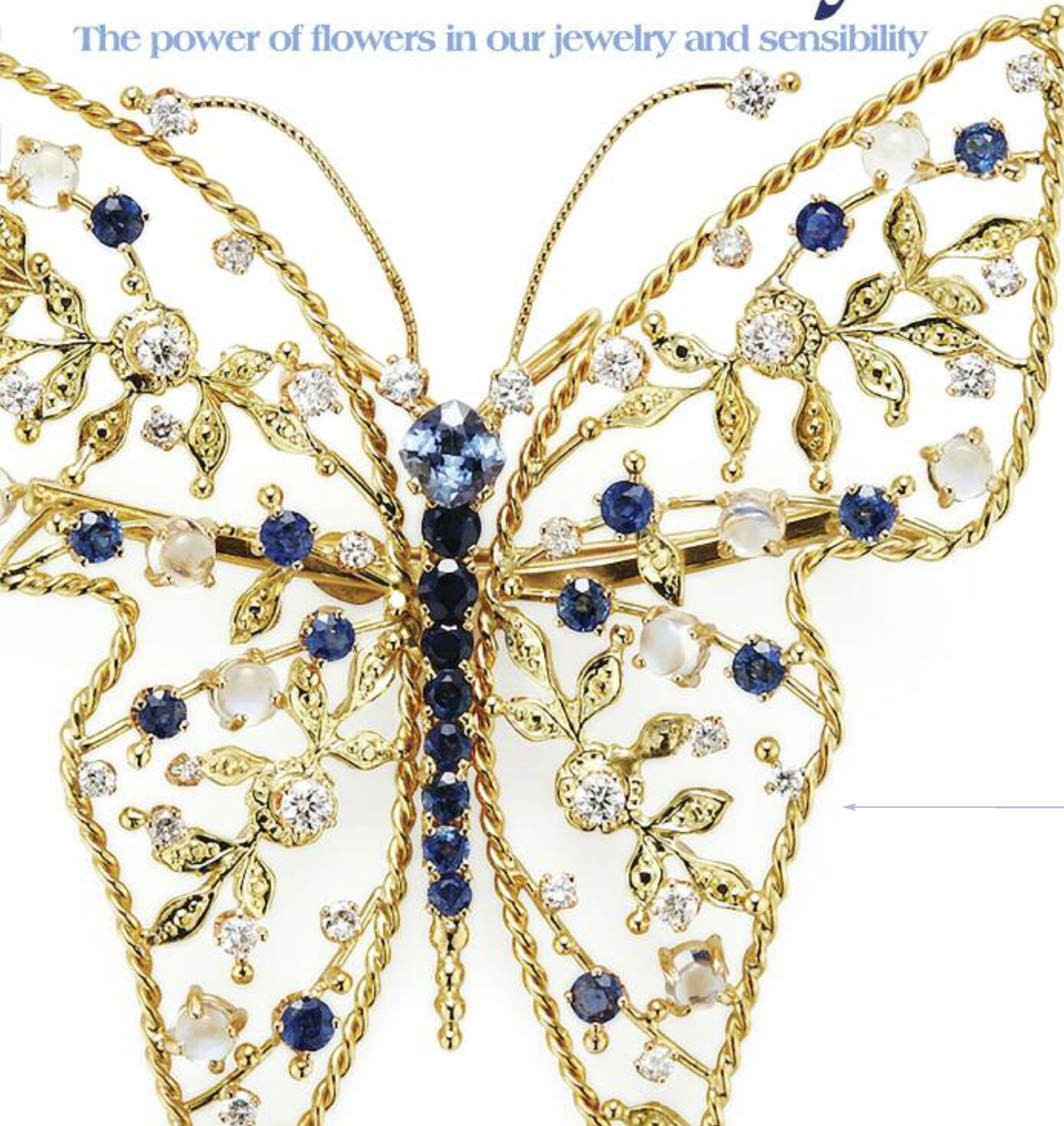
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Floral Frenzy
