






ack in 2007, the Golf Digest ranking of Top Athlete Golfers had Peyton Manning at No. 63, tied with Ahmad Rashad. Both were listed as carrying a 3.4 handicap. To put that in perspective with other famous Colorado athletes, John Elway shared the No. 21 spot (with Steve Bartkowski and tennis champion Pete Sampras) with a 0.2 handicap. In 2012, other in-the-know lists of golfing athletes had Manning with a 4.6 handicap. Either way, he can play golf. He can even hold his own with the pros.


In 2009, Manning paired up with his friend Tiger Woods at the Quail Hollow Championship pro-am. A golf.com article at the time quoted Woods as saying, "We don't get a chance to do it very often with our schedules and seasons overlapping at the wrong time, so when we do get an opportunity like that, it's fun. It's trash talking the entire day."

No surprise there. As Manning has repeatedly shown throughout his career, he is a very serious athlete with a wicked sense of humor. Consider his appearances on Saturday Night Live and any number of TV ads in which he demonstrated the kind of self-deprecating humor that makes a superstar, well, human. And likable. That competitive-yet-humorous-and-humble attitude naturally carries over to the golf course.


Perhaps the one thing Manning doesn't joke about is his commitment to charities, especially those that benefit children in need, and he has been an unwavering supporter of several causes throughout his career. His work in New Orleans in the wake of Hurricane Katrina was well documented; he and his family delivered thousands of pounds of food, water, formula, diapers and other goods to families in need in the city.

In 1999, he launched the PeyBack Foundation, whose stated mission is "to promote the future success of disadvantaged youth

by assisting programs that provide leadership and growth opportunities for children at risk." The foundation focuses its efforts in a three-state region in which Manning has long ties: Louisiana, where he was born; Tennessee, where he attended college; and Indiana, where he made his name in the NFL. To date, the foundation has donated more than \$4.3 million to youth organizations in those states.

One of Manning's primary annual fundraising vehicles is his Peyton Manning Golf Classic, which in 2012 began benefitting the East Tennessee Children's Hospital and the PeyBack Foundation jointly. The June tournament is a four-player team swat (or best ball) and flighted by team handicaps. Manning himself joins all of the teams at various points along the way to hit a ball or two and to have his photo taken with each team so that all participants have a memento to take home. The 2012 tournament was played at Fox Den Country Club in Knoxville, Tenn., which also happens to be home to Manning's beloved University of Tennessee, where he still has very close ties.

While the golf tournament will remain in Tennessee for the foreseeable future, the new Broncos quarterback is already looking forward to being an important part of his Colorado football community, which is good news for the state's disadvantaged children. According to the PeyBack Foundation website, the organization will begin supporting youth-based organizations in Colorado starting in 2013. "The foundation has become a consistent and viable part of the communities of Indiana, Tennessee and Louisiana in terms of underprivileged children and looks forward to supporting organizations in Colorado as well."

While Manning is new to Colorado in terms of being a member of one of the state's professional sports franchises, it may surprise some residents to learn that his roots here, in fact, go deep. To begin with, he has a long, close friendship with Rockies first baseman Todd Helton, a fellow alum of the University of Tennessee where they were both quarterbacks in the mid-1990s. It was Helton who stepped up to help his friend rehabilitate after Manning's neck surgery in 2011. Helton arranged for Manning to work with Colorado Rockies' trainers at the team's facility as part of his road back to active play. The two athletes have visited each other at their respective facilities since Manning arrived in Colorado as a Bronco. (Sadly for Rockies fans, Helton himself is now recovering from hip surgery and will be out for the rest of the 2012 season as he works back to 100 percent.)


As for teammates, the Broncos roster for 2012 includes three other Tennessee grads in addition to Manning: Robert Ayers, Malik Jackson, and punter Britton Colquit. And wide receiver Brandon Stokley played with him in Indianapolis before joining the Broncos, as did tight end Jacob Tamme.

In many ways, Manning already has family here in the Denver area, to say nothing of a built-in golf partner in Broncos executive VP for football operations, John Elway. Rumor has it that Elway has already introduced his new quarterback to Cherry Hills Country Club, and maybe to Castle Pines as well, though no one is yet saying if or when Manning will join up. For his part, Manning has introduced his famed no-huddle, "hurry-up offense" to the Broncos, and along with it a glimmer of hope for a return trip to the Super Bowl for the team.

It appears to be a match made in heaven.

And while football and golf fans in Colorado can't wait to see that legendary Manning acumen on the field of play, whether it be the gridiron or the golf course, the biggest beneficiaries of all may be atrisk children in the state, a population for whom Manning's generosity is equally legendary.








or a golf course that opened just eight years ago in 2004, Lakota Canyon Ranch in New Castle, Colo., has seen a lot of ups and downs. At first, things were going along swimmingly; the Jim Engh-designed course was named to all sorts of lists of top layouts in Colorado and top public links in the Rocky Mountain region. The real estate was selling well, with plenty of locals and second-home owners anxious to purchase the affordable parcels and homes lining the fairways.

But when the recession hit in 2008, the pace of development in New Castle slowed, as it did throughout Colorado and the rest of the country. The unfinished real estate portion of the project fell on hard financial times, and in 2011, the owners were forced to file for bankruptcy. Lakota Canyon was placed in the hands of a courtappointed receiver who was assigned the duty of overseeing the golf course and the development's recreation center. The future seemed murky at best, and most of the long-term plans for the course were put on hold.



Stability returned to Lakota in August, however, when the golf course, recreation center and a significant portion of the developable real estate were purchased by Warrior Acquisitions, the investment arm of Warrior Custom Golf of Irvine, Calif. Best known for its line of custom golf clubs, Warrior has made serious inroads into the golf course management business in recent years, having now purchased 13 courses around the country since 2010. Lakota Canyon is the company's first course in Colorado.

For Warrior, the appeal of the course was immediately evident in its elevated tee boxes, lush fairways and dramatic vistas.

"It's a gorgeous golf course," says Walter Bolen, Warrior's director of investments. "It's the total package. It's not only a great golf course, there's also great real estate around it."

According to Bolen, Warrior had been keeping its eye on the Lakota situation for a couple of years, and when the price dropped low enough, the time was right to step in and make the purchase. The price has yet to be revealed; however, thus far Warrior has targeted courses in the \$1 million to \$5 million range.

For now, Warrior's aim is to maintain the course at a high level and deliver the quality experience that golfers at Lakota have come to expect. Beyond that, the new owners are going to play things by ear and take everything one step at a time.

"There's no real timetable," Bolen says, although he did hint that one long-awaited upgrade—a new clubhouse to replace the existing modular unit—is very much at the forefront of the changes Warrior would like to institute.

In the meantime, visitors to Lakota Canyon won't notice any immediate changes. Warrior intends to keep all of the



existing staff for the time being, and the course, which got a new set of tees and an overhaul of much of the irrigation system, will stay the way it has always been. Given that its status quo is that of an affordable, award-winning mountain course with

spectacular views, that ought to be enough to satisfy even the most particular of golfers.





hen you're Derek Tolan, or one of the hundreds of players like him across this country, you get plenty of time to think about what you're doing with your life. When you're practicing. When you're competing. When you're driving from Kansas City to Denver after missing out on the Web.com Tour Monday qualifying.

Is it worthwhile? Should I keep going? Should I be doing something else? These are the questions players ask themselves as their careers evolve. From the sure-shot to the late bloomer, all have to make a determination for themselves as to what's next. In the meantime, they may not be fighting for their lives, but they are fighting for a lifestyle and a dream.

"These things are hard," Tolan said recently as he rode home from the Web.com Midwest Classic Monday qualifier. "Scores were pretty high today because the course was playing hard. But you have to come out in these things and shoot a really good round. You can't play OK and get in."

Tolan has asked the questions and had the conversations with himself. The fact is that there are as many ways of dealing with this rocky career path as there are players on the path. What keeps Tolan motivated is that he has answers to those questions when his mind asks them.

The former Colorado State medalist from ThunderRidge High School and University of Colorado standout has convinced himself he can do it. He has gone from the highest expectations, when he qualified for the 2002 U.S. Open as a 16-year-old, to the

lows of being forced off the course for months after an automobile accident. It hasn't been an easy road or a short one. But Tolan is pressing on.

His recent win at the Colorado Open provided mental and financial rejuvenation. The \$23,000 first-place share helped, and so did connecting the dots from start to finish in a 72-hole championship. But by his own admission, for most of 2012 he has not played well. His only check from one of the top-tier tours was for just under \$18,000—but it was a PGA Tour event, the Puerto Rico Open, in which he finished tied for 32nd. There have also been those long drives home from unsuccessful engagements, like the recent Kansas City-to-Denver run.

Tolan's mental ace-in-the-hole is his self-evaluation and his learning curve.

He says he isn't struggling with any one particular aspect of his game. In fact, he's convinced he's still learning to play the game better. He believes that he can improve in nearly every realm, and that he's nowhere near his full potential. So he continues to practice with purpose, sure he can learn to play the type of golf that will get him where he wants to go: the PGA Tour.

"All parts of my game are pretty good. I just haven't really played well at the right time," the 26-year-old says. "It'd be one thing if I thought I was a long shot, but in my soul I believe it's just a matter of time. So I have no timetable. I'm just gonna keep playing and trying to get better."

Tolan's mental maturity is also reflected in his evaluation of the professional game as a whole, and his current place in it. No

one is more aware of the competitive level among players who ply the mini-tours and battle it out on the Web.com Tour than Tolan. He knows just how good the players are and how close they are to being top-flight professionals.

He considers himself one of those players, and he's convinced that what it takes for a breakthrough is to play his best at the right time—something he believes PGA Tour stars do regularly. That's why they're PGA Tour stars while others are nibbling around the perimeter.

"The tough part," he says, "and it's hard to explain, is that if you're a really good player you're going to make it. But if something goes wrong .for example a couple of years ago I hurt my wrist right before Q School and I had no chance. My entire year was moot.

"So it happens every year. There are a couple of hundred or a couple thousand players all equally as good or sometimes even better than the guys on the Web.com Tour. They just didn't get the job done at certain times of the year."


Tolan draws inspiration from others who were in his spot but who have managed the crucial moments of execution that allowed them to emerge as winners and move beyond the pack, those who were able to produce their best at exactly the right time. He is still trying to combine those elements.

"You can make it happen any week, and you have to be prepared for it when it happens," he says. "I get the most satisfaction out of doing something well or finishing well in a tournament, like on the PGA Tour earlier this year, and seeing how much room there is for improvement. To not play that well and still compete at the highest level is encouraging."

There is another concept keeping Tolan moving forward. While it would be nice to qualify for and win a Web.com Tour event and gain the exemptions that come with it, his real focus is the PGA Tour Qualifying School at the end of the year. In fact, it's been his annual focus for the last five years.

For now, there will be more Monday qualifiers, mini-tour events and practice sessions until the annual time of reckoning at Q School, which begins in September and concludes with finals the first week of December at PGA West in La Quinta, Calif. That means plenty more miles, questions and road food—and the need for even more determination and focus.





ith 85 films on his resume, lead roles in numerous television shows and an established stage career, actor Christopher McDonald is well known in the entertainment world. Golfers, however, know him as Shooter—Shooter McGavin, that is.

The movie, of course, is Happy Gilmore. "I turned [it] down twice because I was really tired from doing back-to-back movies," McDonald recalls. "The [script] did look pretty funny, and they kept asking me to do it so I decided to go meet Adam Sandler. Within 15 minutes of our meeting, I knew I had to do this movie."


Playing Shooter wasn't difficult for McDonald as he was already a regular on the golf course. And thanks to Happy Gilmore, his game only got better. "My game got sick," the actor says. "I was playing golf five hours a day, six days a week. It was nutty. I had a lot of fun doing that part as a villain who was in on the joke."

McDonald picked up a golf club about 25 years ago thanks to his manager, Scott Manners. Like so many others, he found the game frustrating at first. "I always wanted to kill," he admits. But it only took a few tweaks here and there and McDonald was on his way. At his best, he boasted an 11 handicap; today, he considers himself "a bogey golfer."

Married in 1992, McDonald and his wife, Lupe, currently have busy schedules raising three daughters and one son. The actor has also enjoyed a nonstop career and is accomplished in multiple mediums of the entertainment world. The downside of all that success is that he now finds it difficult to get out on the course. "My home course is in Lake Arrowhead, and we just moved," he says. "If I get on the course three times a month that's good."

Regardless of how often he plays or how steady his game is at any given time, one thing remains true: McDonald is always up for a

charity tournament. He has been at such events as the Child Help tournament hosted by John O'Hurley and Cheryl Ladd, the LPGA's Kraft Nabisco Championship and the Frank Sinatra Celebrity Invitational. He has also been asked several times to play in the Bob Hope/Humana Challenge. So far he has

always been working at that time, but he hopes he can play in it eventually.

One of McDonald's most embarrassing moments on the course was during the making of *Happy Gilmore*. "There was a scene where I'm supposed to miss the putt but look like I'm trying to make it," he says. "No matter what I did, I kept making it, so I told myself to focus on making it and I would miss it. Twenty putts later, I finally missed it."

His most exciting moment wasn't on the silver screen but in a charity tournament. "It was stepping up to the first tee in front of about 300 people at the Frank Sinatra," the actor says. "I wasn't even warmed up. They announce my name and my role in *Happy Gilmore*. [Spectators] are lined up and down the fairway. The cameras are rolling and I hit the most spectacular drive right down the middle, straight as an arrow! It felt fantastic, everyone was cheering, it was like, 'oh man!"

When asked who would make up his ultimate foursome, McDonald gives this question serious thought. "Wow," he exclaims. "Bob Hope, Bobby Jones, Frank Sinatra and one of the three Stooges, the one who plays good golf." That might be considered a fivesome, but it's likely no one would bother McDonald about it.

"Now that I've moved closer to the desert, I can't wait to play there more often. I love playing in the desert." For McDonald, golf isn't just swings and scores. It's the camaraderie between players he has found on the golf course that makes the game "super special." He has encouraged his family, nephew and everyone he knows to try the game.

But when it comes down to it, the part he enjoys the most is the same thing that keeps so many golfers playing. "That one shot, when the ball comes off the club and it's pure. It only happens maybe three or four times in a round; that's why I love this game."

With three new movies coming out this year, a wonderful family life, and more time to get out on the course, it seems that McDonald's life is right where he wants it. When asked to describe his life in one sentence he's quick to reply. "Chris McDonald has life by the tail!"

This year's indoor extravaganza takes place Feb. 8-10 at the Denver Merchandise Mart.

Husband-and-wife team Mark and Lynn Cramer have owned and managed the show since 2001. Months before the expo, Mark says, "A lot of thought goes on behind the scenes. It's still a bit soon to talk about things because I don't promise until I know it's an absolute. But I'm really proud of what this show has become and how the Colorado golfindustry has embraced it."

Cramer has both the blessing and participation of the Colorado Golf Association and the Colorado Section PGA. The CGA holds its annual business meeting at the show, and PGA teaching professionals volunteer their time giving free, onsite lessons. "People may be getting their lesson from a former teacher of the year," says Cramer, who is adamant that all onsite activities require no extra fee beyond the show's admission charge. Free seminars are held throughout the weekend, a driving range allows golfers to try out new clubs-some that may have just been unveiled at the PGA's premier merchandise show in Orlando—and a putting area is available as well.

The show features an expansive Junior Golf Experience, where youngsters can participate in lessons led by collegiate golfers, as well as take part in challenges and receive giveaways. The area is marked by more than 200 photographs of children playing golf at kid-sized eye level—designed to inspire young players. Cramer calls the Used Club Sale a win-win-win situation, because anyone who donates clubs receives a tax writeoff, profits go Colorado junior-golf programs and it's the perfect opportunity for those new

game.

Cramer says this show has become the standard for golf expositions across the nation, yet continually looks for ways to improve the experience. He takes customer feedback seriously. Everyone who walks in the door has the opportunity to take a short survey indicating their preferences about the show, plus offer suggestions for the future. Those who participate in the survey are rewarded, automatically eligible for a spectrum of giveaways throughout the weekend—from hats and shirts to stay-and-play golf vacations in the mountains and out of state. Every attendee receives a number of take-home, golf-related goodies as well.

Cramer is passionate about golf, and says he will do everything possible to help promote the industry. He's especially enamored with the PGA's Golf 2.0 program, an enormous initiative designed to increase play and the number of participants. Last year he helped set up at an onsite meeting room at the expo for around 200 industry professionals to take part in an extensive, three-day workshop outlining the program. "Let's build the game of golf, teach juniors and women, and reach out to former golfers and nongolfers," Cramer says. "We want to make sure everyone knows he or she is welcomed, because golf is a welcoming game." He echoes that sentiment in conjunction with the expo as well.

Admission prices for the Denver Golf Expo have remained constant for years, and advance tickets are available at King Soopers' Tickets West outlets beginning in January. > precise needs. Golf shoes can also be found in ostrich skin, alligator, sharkskin and other exotic materials. Try Alligator Jake's (alligatorjakes.com) for handmade alligator golf shoes. Maybe the most expensive golf shoes on the planet come from John Lobb (johnlobb.com), which will custom make shoes through its bespoke

program. You'll need to visit Paris for the fitting

and the shoes will be ready in about two months.



With golf shoes now available in a wide range of styles and materials, here are some factors to consider before buying:

Pay close attention to the materials. Less expensive shoes are made from less expensive materials. More expensive shoes are made from leather and true waterproof materials.

Sizing differs from brand to brand. Ask anyone who works in a shoe store and they will tell you that a size X in Nike differs from the same size in Adidas.

Look at what the pros are wearing for style tips. Some pros are ultra-conservative while others are more outrageous. What's your style?

Understand that water resistant does not mean waterproof. Take a look at the guarantee to see if the manufacturer backs up the word waterproof.

A simple black shoe or a simple white shoe will work well with pretty much any style of clothing.

The good news is that there are ample options available for golfers who are looking for style, functionality or both.

Martin Laird is tops in terms of professional golfers with Colorado ties. He has earned more than \$2.1 million so far in 2012. His 42nd place finish in the PGA Championship pocketed him \$25,000. Laird hasn't missed a cut in four consecutive starts, and his season-best finish (second place) at The Players Championship added over \$600,000 to his bank account.

Former Denver resident Kevin Stadler broke a streak of four straight missed cuts coming in 11th at the Reno-Tahoe Open. Stadler has made 13-of-20 cuts and ranks 62nd on the money list with \$1.1 million.

Turning around an avalanche of missed cuts, David Duval finished 66th at the Reno-Tahoe Open. Duval has made \$33,000 and change this year, but the former No. 1 player in the world continues to struggle with injury, mental and swing hitches.

Gary Halberg finished second at the Senior British Open in late July. He's won nearly \$700,000 on the Champions Tour by

educing your carbon footprint is all the rage these days. But being environmentally conscious doesn't have to mean leaving your automotive scruples at the door. The Tesla Model S and the Chevy Volt, while two very different automobiles, give you the opportunity to explore an electrifying driving experience.

Tesla came on the scene in 2003 with an all-electric roadster that quickly become the envy of anyone who desired speed and had a penchant for the unique. Tesla showed the auto world that electric didn't have to mean boring or slow.

The display of ingenuity created a demand for something a little more practical, and out of that demand was born the Model S. On the practical side, the Model S seats four and has a battery life that delivers quality range—300 miles on one charge says Tesla of the loaded version of the S.

But it's not just about practicality. The interior's woodlooking panels are made from banana leaves harvested from the forest floor after they've fallen from the tree, while the leather is plush to say the least. And technology is integrated exquisitely, exactly what you'd expect from a group of Silicon Valley designers. The touch-screen control panel is the nerve center of the vehicle, giving access to everything but the Starship Enterprise.

The interior isn't roomy but it isn't cramped, either. The floor is flat—some say giving the Sthe appearance of a minivan—and it's slightly raised in order to provide room for the massive battery carrier underneath. Taller passengers will make friends with the headliner, but it's not unusually low.

On the outside, you'd swear you are looking at a Jaguar XF. On the inside, you'd think Apple has gotten into the car business. A blend of sleek and funky makes the Model S not only interesting but fun, and knowing that you aren't burning an ounce of fuel when you make your morning commute is almost religious. In all of this, don't miss the fact that Tesla loves power. Its brand of electric car has guts.

The Model S has 362 horsepower and 306 lb-ft of torque. That translates to G forces in the turn and slamming you back in your seat on the takeoff. In just 5.6 seconds, the Model S is doing 60 miles per hour. The fun comes from the fact that the electric motor stays in the power band all the time. There is no letdown in torque like you experience from a gas transmission.

The Model S has a very low center of gravity as well. This gives you a decidedly



sporty sense of handling. The weight of the battery sits beneath the vehicle frame instead of in the hood of the car like most gas engines. Taking turns is exhilarating and you notice that there is nearly no body roll as you might expect in a larger car.

Tesla expects to produce only 5,000 of the S. You can choose from four trim packages that provide varying battery range and interior features, and the price ranges from \$49,900 to \$97,900.

On the less exotic side of the electric super highway, the Chevy Volt comes with a gas and electric motor. While the interior

and horsepower are pedestrian, the fun is exceptional. In spite of a motor with just 149 horsepower, the torque of the electric gives it the kick of a Rockette.

The range on the Volt's electric motor is around 40 miles, depending on how you drive it. When the battery is depleted, the gas motor comes to life and takes over, which ensures you're never stranded without a long enough extension cord to reach a plug through your office window. Honestly, most of you don't drive 40 miles in a day anyway, so you can go almost anywhere you need to on the Volt's nightly charge.



The interior of the Volt is what you'd expect from Chevy. Everything works without being obtrusive or clunky. With just a slight learning curve, you'll be navigating all the onboard features like Captain Kirk. The ride of the Volt is surprisingly sporty. Jaunts around the city feel like you're in a much smaller car due to the tight handling and acceleration.

One benefit to buying in Colorado is that the state is tacking an added \$6,000 tax credit onto the purchase of the Volt. So the \$41,000 price tag is decreased by up to \$13,000 on tax benefits. That makes the decision a little easier!

Any negative reviews about the Volt

seem unwarranted in this writer's opinion. The Volt has all the range of a gas-powered vehicle while still giving you the benefits of a robust electric motor. With some forethought, most drivers will charge their Volt often enough to get the range they need for the daily drive—and in doing so, embrace the electric revolution!
